Ngorongoro Crater is the largest unbroken volcanic caldera on earth...2,000 feet deep & about 12 miles wide.










Victoria Falls, Zimbabwe





The Great Rift Valley is basically a huge trench that is in the process of splitting Africa in two...this is due to a divergent plate boundary to the "Geologist" types!






Mt. Kilimanjaro




Mt. Kilimanjaro is the largest FREE STANDING mountain on earth...it is a stratovolcano and is not a part of a mountain range.

The Great Zimbabwe Ruins housed over 20,000 people and covered an area of 200 square miles during it's "heyday" around 1100 AD.






Mosques of Timbuktu
