



Parthenon, Athens, Greece




The Parthenon is considered the most important surviving building of Ancient Greece...stucture was dedicated to the madden goddess Athena & construction was completed in 438 BC.






Red Square






Big Ben

Blarney Castle is home to the famous "Blarney Stone"...an iconic symbol of Ireland & known to bring "LUCK" to anyone who kisses the stone.




Eiffel Tower
